## Student Handbook 2020-21

Welcome to Quarrydale Academy Sixth Form, we hope that your time with us will be enjoyable, memorable and successful! Post 16 education at Quarrydale Academy is an exciting and inspiring time, we hope that with our help, you are able to create the foundations on which your future successes will be built, providing you with the platform to progress to the next stage of your journey.

To support you during your time in Sixth Form, the student hand book has been put together to help you get to know the Sixth Form, it's procedures and the people who will be working with you on a daily basis. As a senior member of Quarrydale Academy, the expectations of you as a student are high, but in return, your expectations of what your Sixth Form experience entails should be equally so. This handbook expands on what these responsibilities and expectations are, and will set out all of the relevant procedures that you will need to know about during your time with us.

Please take the time to read through your handbook, it contains most of the things that you need to know and should answer a lot of questions that you may have about the day to day running of Sixth Form. Please share this information with your parents/carers and make sure you keep the handbook safe.

<b>Key Staff</b>	
<p><b>Head of Post 16:</b></p> <p><b>Mr M. West</b></p> <p><b>Miss L. Straw</b></p>	<p>Mr West and Miss Straw have responsibility for student development and achievement throughout the sixth form.</p> <p>They work closely with the sixth form staff, tutors, teachers, students and parents to ensure appropriate guidance, curriculum and opportunities are available for all students.</p> <p>It is the responsibility of Mr West and Miss Straw to track and monitor all aspects of your progress throughout your time in Sixth Form, both academically and holistically as young adults. They will also ensure that you are supported to develop and implement a plan to support your Post 18 progression, whether that be in accessing Higher Education, an apprenticeship or employment.</p> <p>Miss Straw is also the Designated Safeguarding Lead for Sixth Form students at Quarrydale and will be the person who works with students, their families and other agencies if concerns arise.</p>
<b>Tutor Team</b>	<p>One of the most important people you will meet in the Sixth Form is your tutor. Everyone is part of a tutor group and your tutor will be your first line of contact throughout your time in the Sixth Form.</p> <p>He/She will get to know you as soon as possible and review your progress on a regular basis. Do your best to really get to know this person and make good use of the contact that you will be having. Tutors will arrange individual meetings with every member of their tutor group on a half termly basis to review progress, consider future plans and to discuss any other general issues.</p>
<b>Other Support</b>	<p>During your time in Post 16 there will be lots of opportunities to be involved in extracurricular activities. Staff and students lead the Sixth Form Social Committee, who are responsible for arranging a wide variety of events for Sixth Form students to be a part of. These include sporting events, fundraisers, performances and social events to name but a few. The Social Committee also provides students the opportunity to give their views and voice any concerns regarding Sixth Form through designated student ambassadors. All students have the opportunity to be a part of the committee and more information will be provided in the first few weeks of the school year.</p> <p>For those of you interested in completing an Extended Project Qualification during your time in Sixth Form, help will be at hand to support and guide you through this process. More information about the EPQ will be provided once you have settled in to your new study routines.</p> <p>Students wishing to develop and extend their independent learning skills, research skills and report writing skills to improve their extended writing for longer mark questions and coursework (often required in A Level exams), will also have the opportunity to access support in doing so.</p>

## Quarrydale Academy Sixth Form Expectations

### As a student at Quarrydale Academy Sixth Form you are expected to:

- Develop independent learning skills and a strong work ethic, taking personal responsibility for your own learning and organising yourself accordingly, ensuring you have the correct equipment and resources
- Take responsibility for your personal progress and your future beyond Quarrydale.
- Have individual aspirations and use the help available to achieve these.
- Maintain progress towards your goals and target grades, maintaining effort and commitment to all of your courses
- Attend all exams for which you are entered
- Attend extracurricular sessions and activities that will help with your development and progression (including UCAS sessions, university open days, workshops, skill development sessions and work experience and trips, where appropriate).
- Maintain a good punctuality and attendance record, Attend on a full time basis and arrive punctually to all registration periods and lessons. The school day starts at 8.35am and ends at 3pm. You must notify Sixth Form of any absences.
- Complete all homework, coursework and assignment tasks within the deadlines set by the subject teachers
- Carry out wider reading and independent study for every subject over and above set homework.
- Behave in a manner which causes no offence or danger to other students or to members of staff. You are role models within the school and should act in a way that reflects this.
- Dress in an appropriate manner in accordance with the dress code
- Contribute positively and purposefully to your Sixth Form experience and to our community.
- Access the Sixth Form team if you have any problems or need extra support, we are here to help.

### As a student at Quarrydale Academy Sixth Form you can expect:

- High standards of teaching across all subjects in all lessons.
- The support of staff in all areas of Post 16 life, academic, pastoral and extracurricular.
- Support and guidance to help to make decisions regarding your future beyond Post 16.
- Staff to be approachable and willing to listen to any issues or concerns you may have.
- To be provided with opportunities to take part in extracurricular activities that help develop skills and knowledge essential for your progression beyond Quarrydale,

## A Typical Week

All students will be required to study at least three Level three subjects, with some opting to study four. These can be A Levels, Level Three Btecs or a combination of both. Some students may also be required to re-sit GCSE English and/or Maths if they did not achieve the required Grade 4.

Sixth Form is run on a fortnightly timetable (Week A and Week B) with 5 x 60 minute lessons each day.

Your timetable will be comprised of the following:

- Up to 9 lessons per fortnight per subject for A Level subjects
- Up to 8 lessons per fortnight per subject for Level Three Btec subjects
- Up to 4 lessons per subject per fortnight for GCSE English and Maths resits

All students are allocated to a tutor group comprised of year 12 and year 13 students. There will be a registration period every morning from 8.35am-8.45am and an afternoon registration period from 12.40pm-12.55pm which you must attend. This time is crucial as it is during these sessions that we share key information and messages and hand out any documents and letters that need to go home to parents/carers.

Your tutor will also support you by providing information and guidance on the choices and decisions which you will be making relating to applications for university, apprenticeships or employment opportunities, and will meet with you on a one to one basis at least once every half term to monitor your progress and discuss any concerns you may have. Registration is also an ideal time for year 12 students to speak to year 13 students and gain advice and guidance from those who have recently been in the same position.

There will be additional compulsory periods known as Enrichment and PSHE. These will cover a variety of areas throughout your time in sixth form ranging from academic tutoring, careers advice, financial awareness and university and work applications, as well as personal, social and emotional development. You will also have the opportunity to achieve additional qualifications such as The Extended Project at other times during the week.

In addition to the 'taught' part of your timetable, you will be expected to participate in 'enrichment' activities'. More details of the wide variety of opportunities on offer will be highlighted during your time in the sixth form (e.g. reading pairs, lesson support, peer mentoring, social committee, charity work, work experience, volunteering, mooks). Many higher education courses and employers expect students to have sought relevant experience in

	<p>their chosen area during their time in sixth form (e.g. teaching, nursing and medical applications).</p> <p>Your timetable will also have periods of non-contact time which should be used in a productive way. Study periods should be used to carry out independent study, research, completing assignments and practising practical elements of courses, as well as to complete enrichment activities and getting to know new faces and making new friends.</p> <p><b>At no point during lesson times should students be playing games outside the sixth form area. This not only disrupts lessons elsewhere but also goes against appropriate use of independent study time.</b></p>
<p><b>The Common Room and Study Spaces</b></p>	<p>Downstairs in Sixth Form is the common room, which is a facility provided for <b>you</b> and it should be treated respectfully with any litter placed into the bins provided and furniture left tidily. The common room is an area for socialising but also an area for students to work in, so please be respectful of your fellow students when spending time in here.</p> <p>The upstairs area of Sixth Form is designated study space and noise should be kept to a minimum. The computer area and the upstairs open area are to be used for work and studying at all times during lesson time, if you are taking a break from studying and wish to socialise with your friends please ensure you use the downstairs common room.</p> <p>Mobile phones are only to be used in the sixth form area and should not be used in lessons, registration periods or any workshops/extracurricular sessions you are involved in.</p>
<p><b>The Dress Code</b></p>	<p>In the sixth form you will be expected to dress sensibly and in a respectful manner, maintaining a smart and appropriate appearance that would be acceptable to staff and pupils.</p> <p>Accepted Dress:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Trousers or skirt of an appropriate length.</li> <li>• Tailored shorts of an appropriate length</li> <li>• Shirt, polo shirt or blouse</li> <li>• Dresses of an appropriate length and style.</li> <li>• Sweater, jumper or cardigan</li> <li>• Suit/or jacket and tie (optional)</li> <li>• Appropriate shoes.</li> </ul>

	<p>Unaccepted Dress:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Denim clothing or clothing that has the appearance of denim clothing (Jeggings).</li> <li>• Sports Tops/Sweatshirts</li> <li>• Caps or hats inside the school building.</li> <li>• T-shirts or sportswear (Unless required by a particular subject such as Sport or Dance).</li> <li>• No 'strappy' or cropped tops</li> <li>• Beachwear</li> <li>• Any items of clothing featuring large logos or slogans.</li> <li>• Excessive jewellery or make-up</li> </ul> <p>If your standard of dress is deemed to be outside of our expectations your tutor will speak to you about this, repeated breaches of the dress code will result in a formal meeting.</p> <p><b>All students should clearly have their name badges visible at all times whilst on site.</b> It is crucial on Health &amp; Safety grounds that all students are easily identifiable.</p>
<p><b>Advice and Guidance for Post 18 Progression</b></p>	<p>During the Enrichment/PSHE/Tutor sessions, all students are involved in a range of activities and workshops that will provide advice and guidance on all aspects of Post 18 progression, including Higher Education, Apprenticeships and Employment. The purpose of these sessions is to enable you to make informed decisions and to support you in a successful transfer to life beyond Sixth Form education.</p> <p>There will also be workshops and sessions which focus on the development of transferrable skills, such as interview skills, developing communication skills and presentation skills. These skills will be imperative in your future endeavours and will help you to develop in a holistic way.</p> <p>There are many resources available to students. A range of talks covering specific areas, such as applications, CVs, interviews, specialist careers etc. will be given throughout the year. Information will also be available from the Post 16 team, who are always on hand to answer any questions you may have.</p>
<p><b>16-19 Bursary</b></p>	<p>The 16-19 Bursary fund is designed to help support those young people who face the greatest barriers to continuing in education or training, post-16.</p> <p>The fund has two elements:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Bursaries for vulnerable young persons, such as those in care (Vulnerable bursary)</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Discretionary bursaries for young people facing financial barriers to participation in education, such as those entitled to Free School Meals or with a low household income (Discretionary Bursary).</li> </ul> <p>Bursary funds are to be used to help pay for costs such as: transport, meals, books and equipment and are paid directly in to the student’s bank account on a weekly payment. Payments will only be made to students who adhere to the expectations of Sixth Form and will be withheld if there are any issues with punctuality, attendance, behaviours and the completion of work.</p> <p><b>A briefing will be held for students during induction week.</b> Further information regarding eligibility criteria and application forms are available from Miss Straw.</p>
<p><b>PSHE/SMSC</b></p>	<p><b>PSHE:</b> Personal, Social, Health and Economic Education will be covered in a variety of programmes and activities for all students in Post 16, focussing on the development of knowledge, skills and attributes to keep our students safe, healthy and prepared for the wider world beyond Quarrydale. Details of the PSHE programme can be found on the Academy website.</p> <p><b>SMSC:</b> Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural development is the overarching umbrella that encompasses personal development across the whole curriculum. This will be embedded within the Post 16 curriculum at Quarrydale and will aim to ensure that all students are able to:</p> <p><b>Spiritual:</b> Explore beliefs and experience; respect faiths, feelings and values; enjoy learning about oneself, others and the surrounding world; use imagination and creativity; reflect.</p> <p><b>Moral:</b> Recognise right and wrong; respect the law; understand consequences; investigate moral and ethical issues; offer reasoned views.</p> <p><b>Social:</b> Use a range of social skills; participate in the local community; appreciate diverse viewpoints; participate, volunteer and cooperate; resolve conflict; engage with the '<a href="#">British values</a>' of democracy, the rule of law, liberty, respect and tolerance.</p> <p><b>Cultural:</b> Appreciate cultural influences; appreciate the role of Britain's parliamentary system; participate in culture opportunities; understand, accept, respect and celebrate diversity.</p> <p>Further details can be found on the Academy website.</p>

<b>Procedures</b>	
<b>Attendance</b>	<p>Full and punctual attendance to lessons and registration is required of all students and failure to comply with the Sixth Form expectations regarding this will be taken seriously. Students register in morning and afternoon registration periods and in every lesson they attend.</p> <p><b>Every request for a reference that we receive, whether for part time jobs or full time careers, asks us to comment on your record in this regard.</b> Our systems are very precise and enable us to add your exact percentage attendance to references. Potential employers and Higher Education institutions take a very dim view of poor attendance.</p> <p>All absences <b>must</b> be explained. Any foreseeable absence, such as medical appointments, interviews etc., should be notified in advance to your tutor or Miss Straw/Mr West and any absences due to illness or unforeseen circumstances should be explained by email or phone call on the day to Miss Straw. <b>Please note that driving lessons should not be arranged during school time.</b></p> <p>Should you be absent for any reason, students are expected to liaise with teachers directly or via email, in order to obtain and catch up on work missed. In some instances, it may be appropriate for us to send work home where absence may be prolonged.</p> <p>Consistent absences from specific subjects will initially be dealt with departmentally and may result in the setting of additional deadlines and targets and a review of subject suitability. If no improvement is made it will be dealt with by the Sixth Form team.</p> <p>General poor attendance will always be dealt with by the Sixth Form team, student attendance should be no lower than 96% and is monitored on a weekly basis. If a student's figure falls below 90% the following protocol will be followed:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• If there are no extenuating circumstances, you will be seen and required to improve within an agreed period of time. A letter of concern will be sent home to your parents/guardians alerting them to our concerns.</li> <li>• Any further concerns or no improvement will result in a student's attendance being monitored closely. Parents/carers will be asked to meet with sixth form staff and the student, to discuss the way forward.</li> </ul>

	<p>It is crucial that you are on time for all registration periods and lessons, if you are persistently late without valid reason these concerns will be addressed as above.</p>
<p><b>Holidays</b></p>	<p>Your time in the sixth form is remarkably short, every lesson matters! We cannot emphasize enough our view that time taken out for holidays <b>at any stage of the year</b> has a detrimental effect on student progress and we do not view requests of this sort lightly.</p> <p>No holidays should be taken during the Summer term as both Year 12 and 13 students will be undertaking formal examinations and rigorous assessments. For Year 13, the result of these will impact their Post 18 choices and for Year 12, these will contribute towards their progression into Year 13, which is not automatic but dependent on results of these examinations and assessments.</p> <p>Where it is absolutely unavoidable for a family to take a holiday in term time, a holiday form must be obtained from Miss Straw and the request made at least one month in advance of the holiday. Students will be expected to liaise with teachers to catch up on any work missed as a result of taking a holiday in term time.</p>
<p><b>Student Underperformance</b></p>	<p>During your time in Sixth Form, it is vital that you are maximising all of the opportunities that are on offer to ensure you gain the most successful outcomes at the end of your time with us. This means full participation in all academic and extracurricular activities and consistently exhibiting the appropriate attitude to your studies.</p> <p><b>Under performance can include:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Constant under performance in tests.</li> <li>• Poor attendance and Punctuality.</li> <li>• Missing deadlines.</li> <li>• Failing to complete independent tasks.</li> <li>• Behaviour that falls below the standard required.</li> <li>• Any other cause for concern as indicated by staff.</li> </ul> <p>If any of the above occurs the following procedure will be taken and enforced: After each step there will be a review and feedback of effectiveness (by relevant member of staff / Head of Department) which will be passed to MW/LS. This will allow us to keep relevant logs and monitor performance.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Stage 1: Class teacher discusses issue with student and provides feedback to MW/ LS.</li> <li>• Stage 2: Phone Call to parents by Head of Department/Class Teacher- Inform MW/LS</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Stage 3: Formal letter sent home to parents from Head of Department/Class Teacher- MW/LS to be provided with a copy of the letter.</li> <li>• Stage 4: Formal meeting with student and MW/LS with minutes taken. MW and LS to feedback to Head of Department or Class Teacher.</li> <li>• Stage 5: Formal meeting with student, parents, MW/LS and Class Teacher should they wish to attend. A student agreement will be issued, addressing concerns specific to that particular student.</li> <li>• Stage 6: Students position in Post 16 to be considered.</li> </ul>
<p><b>Coursework and Classwork</b></p>	<p>Coursework and classwork are essential parts of your courses. Engagement in lessons is vitally important and students should ensure that when in lesson they are actively participating by asking questions, taking part in group work, completing set tasks, asking for help etc.</p> <p>For some courses, coursework makes a significant contribution to the final grade you receive. With the support and guidance of your subject teachers, students should complete all coursework and assignments to the best of their ability and in accordance with deadlines.</p>
<p><b>Independent study</b></p>	<p>Level Three study differs from any of the studying you have done thus far, in that there is a greater emphasis on you taking responsibility for your own learning. Of course, subject teachers will provide you with the knowledge and understanding needed to achieve your qualifications and always be on hand to offer additional support, but the most successful students are always those who quickly learn to organise and manage their studies outside of the classroom</p> <p>Some Key Tips for successful Level Three study:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Plan ahead. Get used to organising your time from the start, create a timetable to help with homework and revision.</li> <li>• Deal with difficulties as they arise, discuss them with your teacher/tutor as soon as you can and do not leave them until after a piece of work is expected to be completed.</li> <li>• Use a diary- Make a note of deadlines and any work that you need to complete.</li> <li>• Catch up with any work you have missed as soon as possible.</li> <li>• Plan effectively use of non-contact periods to maximise effective learning</li> <li>• For every hour spent in a lesson, it is advised that you spend at least an hour outside of lesson working on that subject.</li> </ul>

<p><b>Assessment</b></p>	<p>Regular assessments of your progress and commitment to your studies takes place throughout your time in the Sixth Form. An initial assessment of progress will be carried out by subject teachers after students have completed the first six weeks of their chosen courses. The results will be fed back to Miss Straw and Mr West, if there are any concerns raised at this time, these will be addressed with students on an individual level.</p> <p>Assessment data is gathered in each term of the academic year through classroom based assessments and mock examinations in January and June and will be sent home to parents/carers, as well as being viewed by Miss Straw, Mr West and your tutors. This will be an important check on your progress and will highlight any concerns. During this process you will set individual targets to aid your progress.</p> <p>Your progress on Level three courses is matched against your GCSE/KS4 average point score. This is then compared with the national outcomes of similar students who studied the subject over the last 3 years. This provides a VA (value added) Score which considers your progress against similar students nationally with the same KS4 APS.</p>
<p><b>Subject Choices and Changes</b></p>	<p>The process by which you have chosen your courses for this year has been a long and thorough one, however, we are well aware that for some of you, there may be a valid reason for needing to change subjects.</p> <p>Within the first two weeks of the year, changing subjects is possible but you will be expected to justify your reasons for making the change and catch up with any work you have missed. It is not possible to change subjects at a later stage in the year due to the amount of subject content that will have already been delivered, however, we are always happy to discuss your options. It is possible for students taking four subjects to drop a subject and continue to study three but this will need to be discussed with Miss Straw or Mr West.</p> <p>All year 12 students' subject choices will be reviewed at the end of year 12 to assess suitability for year 13 study.</p> <p><b>What should you do if you feel a change is necessary?</b></p> <p>It is important to give your original subject choices time as the transition to Sixth Form study is not instant and it will take a period of adjustment for all students. If you are unhappy after a few weeks, arrange a meeting with Miss Straw or Mr West to discuss alternative options. It is important to remember that for some students, subject choices can affect your progression beyond your</p>

	time at Quarrydale, therefore, these decision should be given careful consideration.
<b>Parent/Carer and Teacher Consultation Evenings</b>	<p>At the beginning of the academic year there will be a welcome meeting for Year 12 students and their parents/carers which will provide an overview of what can be expected of students in Post 16 and the policies and processes that we use in the daily running of Post 16.</p> <p>Parents/Carer consultation evening will occur once during the academic year for year 12 and 13 students. Dates will be provided within the academic calendar at the start of the year and information will be available on the school website.</p> <p>The purpose of the evening is to let parents know how students have settled into the sixth form, the progress you are making, discuss your commitment and potential and to build the partnership between us. It is vital to involve students in the discussion and you are therefore expected to come along too.</p>
<b>Reports</b>	All year 13 students will receive a report in the Autumn Term which will provide a summary of how a student is progressing in their chosen subjects and their wider involvement in Sixth Form. These comments need to be received and acted upon constructively as they will provide useful advice on how to build on the work done in year 12 and how to ensure year 13 is a success.
<b>Exam Entries</b>	Exam entries are paid for by the school for all subjects taken as part of a student's timetable. However, where students' level of commitment is consistently below that expected by the sixth form, you may be withdrawn from the examination and therefore unable to complete your qualification.
<b>Paid Work</b>	Some students will take on a part-time job (evenings or weekends) during their time in the sixth form. Whilst this brings financial rewards and a valuable insight into the world of work, it does come with a warning! Courses post-16 are demanding and require consistent effort and application. If you are applying for part-time employment, you must avoid excessive or late hours. Your priority must be your academic work – the next two years is your chance to prove yourself! You should be aware from the outset that all the research shows that <b>students who work more than 10 hours per week do not do as well as those who keep a sense of balance.</b>
<b>Driving and Car Parking</b>	During your time in Sixth Form, many of you will pass your driving tests. If you intend on bringing a car onto the school site you must provide details of your car to Miss Straw to allow us to identify the vehicle if necessary.

	<p><b>You must drive with due care and attention whilst on or around the school site.</b> There is a 5mph speed limit when driving on school grounds which must be adhered to for the safety of all students and staff. Students may park in the back carpark which is accessible by pressing the 'call' button to alert reception, who will open the gate. Under no circumstances should students park in the front car park.</p>
<b>Communication</b>	<p>Information, messages and notices will be circulated to students via their school email account wherever possible. Students are therefore advised to check their email account on a regular basis. The facility to link your school email account to a personal mobile phone is available. Further guidance regarding this process, is available from the IT team.</p> <p>In some instances, important information will be sent home in letters which will be distributed to students by their tutors. The Academy also uses a text system to notify parents/carers of key dates and provides regular updates on the Academy website and the Academy's Facebook page.</p>

<b>Higher Education, Outreach and Extra-Curricular Activities</b>	
<b>Nottingham Trent University-Progression Programme</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The programme runs throughout year 12 and 13 and offers opportunities to discover more about university life and support with the application process.</li> <li>• <b>Student Shadowing</b> – You will get to spend the day with a current NTU student and experience university life first hand. You'll attend a lecture and a seminar and spend a day on campus.</li> <li>• <b>Subject Master Classes</b> – If you are still trying to decide about the future, then sitting in on these classes will help to inform your decision-making.</li> <li>• <b>Personal Statement Support</b> – Receive support with your UCAS personal statement to help make it the best that you can for your university applications.</li> <li>• <b>Summer Residential</b> – The chance to stay in our university accommodation, make new friends, and develop your skills for success at university.</li> <li>• <b>Library and Gym Facilities</b> – NTU Progression members have access to the library and gym facilities at NTU.</li> <li>• There is no obligation to study at NTU if you take part in the programme, but if you do choose to study at NTU, you'll be offered support throughout your first year as an NTU student.</li> </ul>

<p><b>The University of Nottingham-Ambition Nottingham</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Ambition Nottingham is a free scheme for students in years 12 and 13 aiming provide support to students as they progress through Sixth Form and on to higher education.</li> <li>• It aims to support entry to The University of Nottingham, or other research-intensive universities, by offering a range of experiences and opportunities that will help you prepare for and progress to higher education.</li> <li>• The experiences include subject taster days and masterclasses, support with UCAS and personal statements and student finance.</li> <li>• There will also be the opportunity to apply for a place on one of the university’s Summer School schemes.</li> </ul>

<p><b>Sutton Trust Summer Schools</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The Sutton Trust Summer Schools offer an opportunity for around 2000 young people each year to try university life. The one week taster courses consist not only of lectures, seminars and tutorials, but also a varied programme of social activities, to give participants an accurate idea of life as an undergraduate at a research-led university.</li> <li>• Subjects that can be studied as part of the programme are wide ranging and include architecture, Science, Law, Medicine and many more. The following universities host Sutton Trust Summer Schools each year: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Durham University</li> <li>• University of Bristol</li> <li>• University of Cambridge</li> <li>• Imperial College London</li> <li>• The University of Nottingham</li> <li>• The University of St Andrews</li> <li>• UCL</li> <li>• The University of Warwick</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

<p><b>The Sutton Trust- Subject Specific Programmes</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Pathways to Law-</b> Aimed at students who are interested in a career in law, the programme is run at a number of universities across the country with The University of Nottingham and Nottingham Trent University being the closest universities to our location.</li> <li>• The programme includes: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A range of sessions over two years at the host university, covering a diverse range of topics including choosing and applying to a university, CV and interview techniques, subject-specific revision sessions and workshops on different areas of the law</li> <li>• E-mentoring from undergraduate law students, provided through the Brightside Trust</li> <li>• Work experience in the legal sector, at leading law firms, chambers, regional firms and non-profit organisations such as legal advice centres</li> <li>• A residential conference in the summer between years 12 and 13 to give students a taste of life at university and to take part in a range of workshops, debates and lectures</li> </ul> </li> <li>• <b>Pathways to STEM-</b> Aimed at students interested in a STEEM career, the programme is run in partnership with the University of Nottingham.</li> <li>• The programme includes: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A range of sessions for students, parents and teachers, including tailored education and careers advice; academic classes in STEM subjects and sessions to develop non-academic skills</li> <li>• A residential summer school</li> <li>• A work experience placement in a relevant STEM setting;</li> <li>• The assignment of a mentor</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
<p><b>The Brilliant Club- The Scholars Programme</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The Brilliant Club exists to widen access to highly-selective universities for pupils from under-represented groups.</li> <li>• The programme helps to develop student’s research, analytical, evaluation and academic writing skills, all of which are needed for successful higher education study and are skills that universities are looking for applicants to possess.</li> <li>• As part of the programme, PhD tutors deliver a number of university-style tutorials to small groups of pupils, who then go on to complete a dissertation style assignment.</li> <li>• The assignment is then graded as a university piece of work would be and students are invited to take part in a graduation ceremony at a university.</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The programme usually run in the Autumn term and in recent years has focussed on the areas of STEM and humanities subjects.</li> </ul>
<b>Summer Schools</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>In addition to the Summer Schools programme that is provided by The Sutton Trust, many universities across the country offer students the opportunity to experience university life as part of their Summer residential programmes.</li> <li>University websites will contain all of the information that you need to be able to apply for a programme, applications for Summer Schools usually open in January.</li> <li>In previous years, students from the Sixth Form have attended Summer School at Northumbria University, The University of Nottingham and Durham University.</li> </ul>
<b>The Social Mobility Foundation</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The Social Mobility Foundation (SMF) is a charity which aims to improve social mobility for young people from low-income and underprivileged areas.</li> <li>They provide opportunities and networks of support for 16-17 year olds who would like to progress to higher education.</li> <li>The areas that they focus on are: Accountancy, Architecture, Banking &amp; Finance, Biology &amp; Chemistry, Business, Engineering &amp; Physics, Law, Media &amp; Communications, Medicine, Politics, and Technology.</li> <li>They run many programmes and Summer Schools with their partner universities which help to prepare students for university and to secure the offer of a place to study at degree level.</li> </ul>
<b>University Open Days</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>If you are planning to go to university it is important that you attend as many open days as possible.</li> <li>Open days allow you to gather information about the university, the facilities and accommodation. They also allow you to get a feel for the teaching style, atmosphere and location of a university.</li> <li>We will be visiting the following universities for open days throughout the year: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The University of Nottingham</li> <li>Nottingham Trent University</li> <li>The University of Derby</li> <li>Lincoln University</li> </ul> </li> <li>In addition to these, you should also try to attend open days at other universities that you may be considering.</li> <li>If a group of students express an interest in visiting a university further afield, it is possible that we can make arrangements for this to happen.</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Open day information, including dates and booking details can be found on university websites and is also displayed in the computer area upstairs.</li> </ul>
<b>Subject/Career Specific Sessions</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Alongside visiting university open days, we also encourage you to attend and participate in subject and career specific events that are run by various universities.</li> <li>• Last year, students attended sessions and taster days based on: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Sport at Nottingham Trent</li> <li>• Teaching run by Bishop Grosseteste University</li> <li>• Medicine at the University of Nottingham</li> <li>• Physics at the University of Nottingham</li> <li>• Health and Social Care at Bishop Grosseteste University</li> </ul> </li> <li>• More information on these events will be provided throughout the year.</li> </ul>
<b>Outreach Sessions</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Throughout your time in Post 16 we will be visited by a number of external organisations.</li> <li>• These will include universities and other education providers, apprenticeship providers, industry providers, student finance, one of the major banks, charity organisations, unions and individuals from a variety of professions.</li> <li>• These sessions are for your benefit and provide lots of useful and informative information, therefore, you should ensure that you attend and participate in these sessions.</li> </ul>
<b>NCS- National Citizen Service</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Many students may have completed a four week NCS programme at the end of year 11 and will no doubt have had a fantastic time!</li> <li>• For those who did not get to take part in the experience, NCS are running an additional programme in October half term that you are able to apply for.</li> <li>• NCS looks fantastic on CVs and UCAS applications and is recognised by universities. It allows you to develop a multitude of essential skills, to try new challenges and to meet new people.</li> <li>• NCS representatives will be coming in to school to provide more information on the October half term programme.</li> </ul>
<b>Apprenticeships</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• For some students, university is not the only option that will be considered as a progression route after Sixth Form, and for many, apprenticeships are a great alternative.</li> <li>• Throughout the next two years, particularly during year 13, we will work closely with West Notts College, Industry providers, ASK apprenticeships and many others to ensure</li> </ul>

	<p>that students wishing to apply for apprenticeships are supported and prepared for the application process.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Information on the types of apprenticeships available and where to find them will also be available throughout the year.</li> </ul>
<b>Work Experience</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• For some students, work experience will be a requirement during your time in Post 16.</li> <li>• This may be a requirement for some students studying Btec level three courses or may be needed for your university applications. Whatever the case, we will help you to secure relevant work experience.</li> <li>• When applying to university, certain areas of study will require that you have done work experience, these include medicine, nursing, physiotherapy, teaching and social work. Ensure that you research what your course entry requirements are and plan accordingly.</li> </ul>
<b>Future Learn</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Online courses in a broad range of subject areas</li> <li>• Help to support independent study skills and self-direction</li> <li>• Allows students to develop knowledge beyond subject choices</li> <li>• All students will complete a course that is of personal interest as part of the tutor programme</li> </ul>
<b>The National Collaborative Outreach Programme- NCOP</b>	<p>NCOP is a government funded initiative founded to help students from socially deprived areas access Higher Education opportunities and overcome the barriers to educational progress. As a school and Sixth Form, we work closely with the various strands of the programme to support our students, helping them to develop knowledge and skills for the future.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Access Champions: One to one student mentoring with a progression specialist throughout year 12 and year 13. Support is provided to research progression routes, complete applications and provide advice and guidance on any other aspect related to post 18 progress.</li> <li>• INTO University- The INTO University team work with students from Y9-Y13 on a wide range of areas, including the development of academic and employability skills, CV and application writing and support with Post 18 progress. They are able to provide students with the opportunity to visit universities, apprenticeship providers and employers and work with students in groups and on a one to one basis.</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• DANCOP- This is the Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire strand of NCOP providing tailored support to schools in the area. They provide skill enhancement based sessions, Knowledge building sessions, careers advice and guidance and a wide variety of trips and visits for students.</li> </ul>
<b>Extra-Curricular and Enrichment Opportunities</b>	
<b>The Post 16 Social Committee</b>	<p>The Post 16 Social Committee is run by our students and aims to organise and encourage participation in a wide variety of social events and activities.</p> <p>All students are given the opportunity to be a member of the committee and it is hoped there is something for everyone within the activities and events the students organise. <b>Shout Magazine</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Shout is a community magazine based in the Skegby and Stanton Hill area surrounding Quarrydale Academy. From September 2018, Shout will be working in collaboration with the students of Quarrydale Academy to edit and produce the magazine.</li> <li>• It will include write ups of events and activities that have taken place and a variety of other articles and features which will be produced by students.</li> <li>• The editing and presentation of the magazine will also be done by our students and once produced, almost 3000 copies will be distributed locally.</li> </ul>

<b>Q-Radio</b>	<p>At Quarrydale Academy we have our own radio station which was set up by our students, for our students. It is based in the Sixth Form area of the school and run by a number of Post 16 students but is contributed to by students across all year groups.</p> <p>The radio is streamed across school at break and lunch times and features live musical performances, talk shows, interviews with students and staff and topical broadcasts as well as playing a wide variety of music.</p> <p>Student involvement is always welcome!</p>
<b>The Lessons From Auschwitz Project (LFA Project)</b>	<p>Every year two students are selected to participate in the LFA project, a four part programme designed to increase and develop understanding of the holocaust and its lasting effect on humanity. Students must:</p> <p>Attend an initial orientation seminar</p> <p>Participate in a 24 hour visit to Poland where they visit Auschwitz.</p> <p>Attend a follow up seminar once the visit has taken place.</p> <p>Share their experiences with other students, increasing awareness of the Holocaust, through presentations/assemblies/reports etc.</p>
<b>India Visit</b>	<p>Quarrydale Sixth Form supports a school and children's home in India and as part of this we offer students the opportunity to visit India and experience life at the place. The purpose of the visit is to provide a unique experience that will be life changing, eye opening and give experience of a different culture, as well as help develop skills such as teamwork, communication, and independence that will be beneficial in the future.</p> <p>Whilst in India, the pupils take in a range of activities these include; teaching in the school, running art and craft clubs, organising and running sporting activities, visiting the local town and the surrounding rural areas, taking the pupils from the school on a day out to the beach, taking part in celebration events, and just spending time with children making friends and having fun.</p>
